**THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS:** The devotion of the Stations of the Cross is a long-lasting practice in the life of the Catholic Church. There is a history, for many a devotion. The history of their particular devotion has roots in hundreds of years. The formation of the fourteen stations is gradual. The following is sketched history by various authors who looked at the history of this devotion and practice. Christ is the subject of the Way of the Cross or 'Via Crucis' when he carried His heavy cross from Pilate's praetorium to Calvary. Tradition speaks of Mary the Mother of Jesus walking the dolorous way as well as the disciples and holy women in recollection and prayer. The early Christians did the same; they came to Jerusalem in such great number that Emperor Hadrian (117 – 138) built a pagan temple on Mount Calvary to keep the pious pilgrims away. But when St Helena (325) found the true cross of Christ on Calvary and built a Christian church on the spot where the pagan temple had stood, there was such a mighty concourse of people to the holy places that Jerusalem became the greatest place for pilgrimage in the world. Later, the Holy Land fell into foreign hands. Hence, the original 'Way of the Cross' could be made only with great difficulty and danger. When the invaders blocked access to the Holy Land, reproduction of the stations were erected at popular spiritual centres in Europe. In 1342, the Franciscans were appointed as guardians of the shrines of the Holy Land. They gradually introduced the devotion of the Stations of the Cross in Europe; it spread all over the world. It is now universal and one of the most popular Catholic devotions. The devotion mirrors Christ's love for the human race to which we belong. Christ died for every single person. That single person is me. To be loved at all times and in the fullness of time is my greatest gift from the God incarnate. Let each of us make this a reality by finding time for meditation, prayer and contemplation, if not daily but as often as possible during the season of Lent.
